Jewish Women's Foundation Focuses Attention on Jewish Single Mothers

The newly-established Jewish Women's Foundation (JWF) has identified connecting Jewish single mothers to the community as the subject of their first grant.

The JWF identified the needs of Jewish single mothers as a priority issue through a series of focus groups with leaders from throughout the San Diego Jewish community. In addition to the focus groups, the results of the recent San Diego Jewish Demographics Study demonstrated that this is a growing population which is underserved.

"The study showed that at least 5,000 children in our Jewish community are growing up in single-parent households, the vast majority of them headed by women. This statistic, combined with our research, confirmed that the needs of Jewish single mothers are a key concern for our attention and our dollars," stated Jan Tuttleman, JWF Founding Chair.

Further discussions with affiliated and unaffiliated Jewish single mothers helped JWF identify and prioritize the key needs of this population. The priority issue that emerged was the cost of being Jewish including synagogue membership, Hebrew schools and programming, and the lack of resources to assist with daily activities such as transportation and childcare.

"In our discussions with mothers, they told us they needed information and resources about existing services and advocacy for their needs. Through direct funding and finding partners, we intend to make this happen," said Marjory Kaplan, Jewish Community Foundation Executive Director.
